

There was of course still no pavilion and this remained the case until 1956 when a small removable pavilion was erected on the North Road side of the common, after obtaining all necessary permission and local approval. Water was also connected. This provided shelter allowing teas to be served to players and spectators alike.

Priestner (26) and T. Bird (27 not out) had a merry knock. The declaration was made at 112, and from the start of the NALGO innings the Chesham Bois bowlers, K. Swain 4 for 3, I. Gough 3 for 4, and I. Gomm 2 for 0, dictated the course of the game.

Hearn runs started to come at a quicker rate. Hearn gave a lesson in picking the ball to hit, his fifty coming with a beautiful four on the last ball before tea. He was out soon after for a good 51, and together with R. Fox (19) helped to make the score a winning one. Set to get 120 to win in two hours Old Challoners went for the runs and scored quickly until at 26 a very good one from I. Gomm, who showed greatly improved form to return the figures of 5 for 18, got past P. Brennan (18), who proved to be the only batsman to reach double figures. At 5 for 50 the shutters were put up, but Chesham Bois kept attacking and secured the last wicket with five minutes to spare.

—Chesham Bois won the toss and decided to bat first. After losing an early wicket, A Franklin (35) and G. Sills (25) retrieved the position and began to set about the bowling. Worse was to come for the Holden fielders, who stuck manfully to their task throughout a very hot afternoon, for J. Hearn hit his second 50 in two days, and his third in four innings, and R. Baert stayed until the tea break for 33 not out. Holden decided to play for a draw, but only Whybrow, who played a very stubborn innings of 18, had any success due to fine bowling by K. Swain, 4 for 5, and G. Sills, 3 for 7.

Bird (9) was clean bowled by P. Dwight and A. Gurney (14 not out) played a sound part to bring their total to 57.

Ballinger began their innings just before tea, the first wicket falling suddenly. Then, with P. Dwight (19) batting like a hero, and P. Carr (7)

keeping one end fast, they made the game more promising. But several wickets fell quickly, until a fine stand between A. Harding (10) and P. Lapham (9). After a great struggle they passed Chesham Bois' score. A. Harding was bowled by I. Gomm. Then in came L. Haddock, and not being a bat, instead of opening bottles, he opened his eyes, and much to everybody's surprise made a score of fifteen runs. The final total was 88. T. Bird (Chesham Bois wicket keeper) played a wonderful game, a credit to himself. M. Squires showed his older comrades a lesson in fielding. Bowling analysis: L. Haddock 3 for 9; P. Slade joined the former, and together they slowly took the score to 48 before J. Priestner was bowled by C. George. With time growing short D. Slade (31 not out), ably assisted by R. Fox (11), F. Willis (7) and A. Gurney (12 not out) scored 40 runs in 20 minutes, to enable Chesham Bois to declare the innings closed. Nalgo started by going for the runs, G. Pinn (30) and C. Honour (17) heavily punishing the bowling. However, once these had left, the Chesham Bois bowling gained the upper hand and were only thwarted from gaining a victory by stubborn batting by D. Small and P. Mayne.

Newland Park T.C. 31. Chesham Bois 32 for 4,—Newland Park won the toss and decided to bat first. The Chesham Bois bowlers, A. Franklin (1 for 9) and R. Fox, who returned the excellent figures of 5 for 18, were on top throughout the innings, except for a short spell against F. Exist (11) who with some unorthodox but effective batting temporarily upset them. Against some very accurate spin howling by E. Smith (3 for 7) Chesham Bois had to fight for the runs and of the earlier batsmen only G. Sills appeared confident. However, the score was slowly approached and F. Willis (8 not out) and J. Hearn (10 not out) had the satisfaction of being the instruments to gain the first victory of the season for Chesham Bois.

A NOTE FROM THE AUTHORS.

It has been discovered that from the onset of cricket on the present ground (1891) until the early 1950's, exact year not known, matches were played with the pitches running from North Road to South Road, unlike the present day with pitches running from Amersham Road towards the Rectory.

This was no doubt due to the coming of Sunday cricket when more pitches were needed and the cricket square was extended to accommodate the increased number of matches played.
